

We are very happy to have the Johnson County Iris & Daylily Society agree to host this year's Region 17 Annual Meeting. The meeting will be held August 3-4 at the Hampton Inn & Suites in Cleburne, TX. More information and the registration form may be found later in this newsletter. We are limited to 64 guests, so be sure to send your registration in early. The deadline for the special group rate at the hotel is July 4th, so make those reser-

vaions now. The registration is "all inclusive", except for the hotel rooms. All meals (breakfast is included for hotel guests), meetings, and a 3 hour judges training are included with the registration fee. Please support the host club by booking your room at the host hotel and by mailing in your registration and check as soon as possible.

Region 17 must have an annual business meeting as stated in our by-laws. At present, we have no one committed to host in 2019 or beyond. Bonnie Nichols is our Region 17 Meeting Liaison and has a very informative PowerPoint program on *How to Host a Regional Meeting*. To help you get started, Region 17 will provide the host club with \$500 "seed money". In this newsletter is a list of all the clubs who have hosted a regional meeting and when. Hope to see many of you in April at the AIS National Convention in New Orleans. If you love Louisiana Irises as I do, you are bound to see some beautiful gardens and blooms. It has been several years since I visited New Orleans and Dan and I are really looking forward to the trip.

HOSTING A REGIONAL MEETING



THE JUDGES CORNER

Al Elliott—R17 Judges Training Chair

This is my favorite time of the year. The irises are coming in bloom to show all the beauty the hybridizers could muster. The show bench is filled with all colors of the rainbow, tall bearded to medians, and horns to pom-poms.

The color of our garden is a sea of iris blowing gently in the Texas breeze (or gale winds in most areas).

This is also the most challenging time for the iris judges. We have been asked to judge in the exhibition shows to reward the exhibitor for his/her cultivation of the iris, their selection, conditioning, and grooming of the potential "Best Specimen of the Show." We watch the public come to the show and "Ooh" and "Ah" the majestic iris and question why or how the "Best in Show" was selected. Hopefully they make a list of their favorite iris and come to the annual sale to buy their "Queen" and some may even join the local affiliate. They second guess why an iris was awarded the red ribbon and not a blue. If we stay around too long, the iris we gave a red will continue the bloom process and four hours later would have been a blue, and we will be challenged as to why we only gave it a red. We are known to judge slow and get out of town fast.

We now receive the AIS official ballot and begin the process to select the best iris in the various classes and select, what we hope, is the Dykes winner. We have spent many hours in our garden, cultivating and observing the growth of our iris. Our vote is for the irises that we have grown or observed in our friends garden over the past two or three years.

This is our most difficult challenge. We do not care if the iris is from the Hillcrest Iris Gardens, Seandel Iris Gardens, The Shady Spot, The Lab or if it is a tall bearded or multi-colored or is the most beautiful space age. We dig out our page worn and dog eared AIS Handbook for Judges and Show Officials to ensure that the iris we are voting for meets the variety criteria. We do not take our ballot to the AIS convention and vote the ballot based on the convention gardens, unless we have viewed them over the past two or three years in those gardens. We review our documentation over the past years and with much deliberation, we vote. The public and hybridizers are relying on us to make that very conscious decision.

Winter is about over and it is getting time to get ready for iris blooms.


Hope everyone has a great bloom season this year.

A.I.S. Region 17 Distinguished Service Award

Designated to publicly recognize and honor a member of A.I.S. Region 17 for outstanding service to A.I.S. and Region 17

Qualifications: To be eligible for this award, nominees shall, as a minimum, have the following qualifications:

Be a member in good standing of AIS Region 17 Have provided outstanding service to AIS and Region 17

Selection: The selection of the award recipient shall be in accordance with the following guidelines:

Selection Committee: The award recipient shall be selected by a committee comprised of:

Present RVP – Committee Chairman

Immediate Past RVP

Most recent award recipient

Two members "at large" to be selected by vote of the regular Region meeting. The two at large members shall serve a term of one year only, and shall not be eligible for reappointment as "at large" members to the committee for three (3) years.

Current committee members shall not be eligible for nomination to receive this award during their term of service on this award committee.

Nominations: Nominations for this award may be made by the committee, or by an Iris Club/Society or any five members in Region 17. Nominations by such organizations must be made in writing with justification and qualifications for nominations, and must be received by the Selection Committee no later than March 15th of the current year.

<u>Selection of Nominees:</u> The committee shall review all nominations, justifications, and qualifications and determine if sufficient information is available to justify presentation of the award.

Should the committee decide that there is no qualified nominee, or the committee cannot agree on a single nominee, no award shall be presented for that year. To avoid decreasing the prestige and honor associated with this award, the committee should make every effort to ensure the recipient is duly qualified through his/her outstanding service.

Frequency: Only one award may be presented in any year.

<u>Disclosure:</u> No committee member shall in any way disclose or cause to be disclosed, the name, address, or local society of the individual selected to receive the award. This information shall remain secret until time for presentation at the annual banquet.

Location and time of presentation: The award shall be presented by the Region 17 RVP (Committee Chairman), or his/her duly authorized representative, during the banquet at the Re-

gion 17 annual meeting. In order to maintain the element of surprise, the name of the recipient shall not be disclosed until time for the presentation.

Award: The award shall be in the form of a uniquely designed award identifying the name of the award, as presented by Region 17. The name and year shall be engraved on the award. Once engraved the award shall be kept by the RVP in a secure location to prevent disclosure until presentation. The award is to be permanently retained by the recipient.



WHERE IS TOM BURSEEN

Ol' Tom is still "around", but Father Time has kinda caught up with the Mad Scientist. For Region 17 members who may not know, Tom Burseen is a "mad scientist" by virtue of the unorthodox concepts and methods he employs in breeding the favorite flower of an iris society in his 2 acre garden.

This garden is referred to as *The Lab* cuz laboratories are where Frankensteins do their thing. Since the Mad Scientist has been doing "his thing" for 38 years and is now a 72 year old "scientist", Father Time has indeed caught up with Ol' Tom. Coupled with a complete loss of hearing capacity, the Mad Scientist does not get out much anymore and this includes attending social events such as iris functions. While this should explicate why members do not see Ol' Tom anymore, it should not signify experimenting is not still going on at The Lab. Such experimentation not only keeps the old mind active but also provides plenty of exercise to keep the old body as vernal as possible. Actually, the hybridizing of tall bearded iris, along with the associated (chores), probably renders assignments too "exercise" (energy/time) for a 72 year old person. Thus the Mad Scientist is in the process of "cutting back". Can't imagine ever giving up the fascination of creating new and different irises ,but the rigors of introducing and selling plants has been handed down to something called the OK TEXAS IRIS ALLIANCE. The following excerpt is from the 2017 catalog from The Lab expounds such an "alliance":

Major changes are befalling The Lab (and the mad scientist) out of necessity. Mother Nature's recent excessive and out-

rageous weather (blame "global warming"), and Father Time have both overtaken the mad scientist and CUTTING BACK is the only viable resolution. Breeding tall bearded irises here on the prairies of Texas will probably never cease but all the work and time involved in introducing and selling the resulting creations just had to be compromised! It simply is time to relinquish the time and work (and, benefits) of introducing and selling Texas bred plants to some young folks!!! An alliance of such persons from Oklahoma and Texas has been conceived and they have accepted the responsibility to make such commitments. The OK TEXAS IRIS ALLIANCE includes Hugh Stout from Stout's Gardens at Dancing Tree in Oklahoma, Hooker and Bonnie Nichols from Hillcrest Iris Gardens in Texas, and Judy Schneider from her Shady Spot Gardens in Texas and the "old man" here on the prairies of Texas. All these iris fanciers will be selling and introducing creations being produced on the prairies of Texas here at The Lab. An amelioration that can be reaped from such an alliance is the actuality that all of these young folks do much (most) of their proceedings electronically (on things called computers and internets), something the mad scientist never (does not have) a hankering for.

This concept of selling and introducing irises is an unprecedented occurrence in the world of irises but was well accepted by most iris folks as per another excerpt from the 2018 catalog coming from The Lab. This extract also further illuminates the Mad Scientist's situation and state of affairs:

The only justification for producing and distributing this catalog is to introduce such creations as specified by the American Iris Society. By now most folks should be aware Burseen creations are being sold and introduced by something called the OK Texas Iris Alliance. This "alliance" is comprised of 4 members: Hugh Stout and his STOUTS'S GARDENS AT DANCING TREE in Oklahoma City, OK, Hooker & Bonnie Nichols and their HILLCREST GARDENS in Dallas,

TX, Judy Schneider and her SHADY SPOT in Whitesboro, TX, ...and the Mad Scientist. You may not, however, be aware that the only incentive that compels the Mad Scientist to continue to introduce plants stems from the fact other Alliance members do not care to introduce such plants because they may be too extreme for their discrimination or may not meet acceptable criteria for performance as standardized by the American Iris Society and its judges--characteristics such as bud counts, branching, closed standards, good growth, consistent bloom habits, ETC. The Mad Scientist's primary criterion for introducing new creations has always been founded on the fact that they be original if not different than what is already "out there". It must be disclosed that "acceptable Performance criterion" is often ignored when selecting and introducing such "weirdos". The Mad Scientist must also confess that selling and introducing irises is not a favorite "pastime" and acceptable stock (quantities) of introductions is often quite limited. Also new introductions may not be grown and increased (offered) for more than a couple of years... sooooo...if one wants such unusual and different flowers in one's garden knowing full well they may not be good garden subjects or win ribbons at shows GET 'EM WHILE THEY LAST (are available)...but...if one wants nice and pretty Burseen creations that are good garden performers and may even become a queen of a show one should obtain the Burseen creations being offered by other Alliance mem-

Another excerpt from the 2018 catalog may be kinda amusing to region members but it describes another profound "change" in conducting gardening and business in Ol' Tom's backyard:

The Lab

A LABORATORY PARABLE - A.K.A. SPURGEVILLE

Not sure how familiar all you gardeners out there may be with the weed called "spurge" but for 20 years the Mad Scientist has consequently been trying to eradicate (control) such a plant in his garden (the Lab). It is a prolific, rapid growing, prostrate weed that produces profuse amounts of seeds, seemingly from the day it germinates. A week does not pass, and rarely does a day go by, that the Mad Scientist does not de-weed the garden spraying herbicides but mostly hoeing and physically removing every spurge plant so all those seeds on those d--- plants cannot germinate but it almost seems as if the more one hoes the more they grow. Even though such conditions suffocated homo sapiens and iris plants (can one say "rot"?), spurge plants thrived!

The Mad Scientist took a (unusual) summer vacation in 2017. When he returned spurge had literally taken over

(over run) the whole garden. Such a situation made "weeding" a waste of time so the Mad Scientist has surrendered the long battle to control spurge. Admitting defeat is a hard pill to swallow. The "goal" of a weed free garden will never be realized.



Because spurge is now unfettered, it has enshrouded just about everything at The Lab. Hopefully those old iris sages know what they were talking about because The Lab could become the Spurge Capital of the world, hence, SPURGEVILLE!!!

All of this stuff should explain "where Tom Burseen is at" nowadays!

We have a fun weekend planned for you with a very special guest speaker and Judge's Trainer, Anna Cadd from Healdsburg, CA. She is an AIS Master Judge and current Vice President of the Spuria Iris Society. She will be instructing a three hour class on Spurias Saturday morning as well as talk to us about the "Enchanted Beauty of Spuria Irises" after the Saturday evening banquet. We have planned a Pizza Party for Friday evening along with fun and games. A free hot breakfast is provided as part of your room reservation with the Hampton Inn. For the noon meal, there will be sandwiches and snacks, and a fajita buffet for the Saturday evening meal. The meeting registration, including all meals AND the 3 hour judges training, is \$65 if paid by June 4. After June 4, registration will increase to \$75. Registration form is on page 35.

The Hampton Inn & Suites, 1996 W. Henderson (Tx. Hwy 67) will be our headquarters. We have a small block of rooms reserved and the rates are very competitive. A standard king or 2 queens will be \$89 and a king or 2 queen suite will be \$99. Please book your room by July 4th, using group code <u>AIS</u>, to get the special rates. Also, the city fire code limits the meeting room to only 64, so we will have to cut off the registrations when we reach this number. Any registrations coming in after we reach the limit will be put on a waiting list.

The Hampton Inn is located on the west side of Cleburne near Lake Pat Cleburne, which can be seen from the hotel. Just across the lake/Nolan River bridge is Cleburne's Chisholm Trail Outdoor Museum that includes the 1st courthouse in Johnson County which has been accepted as the oldest log courthouse in Texas.

Meet Our Fall Regional Guest Speaker Anna Cadd



Anna Cadd was born and raised in Poland during the "ancient times", when *Iris pseudacorus* was growing in every pond, the gardens were devoted to producing food (meaning fruits and vegetables) and "Beverly Sills" (Hager, 1979) was the most magnificent achievement in the iris world. Strangely enough, Anna was the proud owner of one rhizome of this beauty!

She was aiming high to become a medical doctor, but her inability to kill the rats, frogs, and rabbits make her change her mind so she switched to botany, as the plants don't scream so loud. She managed somehow to get a Master's Degree (MD) in Biology and a Doctor's Degree (PhD) in Plant Ecology. Next step for her was the stint in the Plant Breeding and Acclimatization Station, where she was crossing wheat and rye together and successfully was the author of several introduced lines and varieties of Triticale. (ED. Note: Triticale is a wheat X rye hybrid used mainly for fodder)

Due to the difficult political climate at that time, Anna decided to enrich her experiences and came to visit her aunt and uncle in Santa Rosa, California, USA. After she married David Cadd— she settled in Healdsburg, California in the home built by David's grandparents. Now everything was simple — she worked full time, and together with David, managed a big home garden and their commercial Cadd's Beehive Iris Garden which introduced 101 iris varieties: 68 Bearded (49 TB, 16 BB, 1 IB, 1 SDB, 1 AB) and 31 Beardless (32 Spuria and 1 PCN). They received from the American Iris Society - 11 Awards of Merit, 31 Honorable Mention Awards, William Mohr Medal, John C. Wister Medal and

twice the Eric Nies Medal. They also received 8 trophies from International Competition in Florence, Italy; 2 medals from Competition in Moscow, Russia; 2 Trophies from Middle-European Iris Society in Poland, Slovakia and Czech Republic; Trophy from Tecomah Competition in France and 2 Medals in Competition in Munich, Germany. They won the Santa Rosa Iris Society Best of Show at least 10 years in a row, managing to enter close to 100 varieties each year. Anna built countless flower arrangements during the Shows and meetings and she is an accredited AIS Master Judge.

After David passed away in 2015, she is the sole proprietor of Cadd's Beehive Iris Garden, growing well over 1500 iris varieties.

Anna is very excited to visit AIS Region 17 and her friends in Texas and will be speaking about one of her favorite irises, the Spuria. She is a very proud member and current vice-president of the Spuria Iris Society. Anna tells us that Spuria irises are very easy to grow, beautiful in the garden, offered to extend the bloom season and are very valuable in the floral industry.

Strangely enough, they are not very popular and recognized in the iris world, with a limited number of commercial gardens offering them for sale and with only a handful of Spuria iris hybridizers around the world. The number of introductions of Spurias is less than 1% of all introduced irises annually.

Anna thinks there is a great need to train AIS Judges to recognize and properly evaluate Spuria irises in the garden and on the Show benches and also to infuse her enthusiasm and love for Spurias to everybody who is willing to listen. She will give 3 hours of classroom Judges Training on August 4, 2018 and, later during the dinner, she will speak about her journey in AIS and developing her love for Spurias - The Enchanted Beauty of Spuria Irises.

She hopes to gain new enthusiasts and Spuria lovers in Texas!
